Hiring physically qualified workers

It's estimated that up to 50 percent of work injuries occur to new hires in their first year. Half of these injuries are musculoskeletal disorders, including: sprains, strains, cumulative trauma, herniated discs and rotator cuff tears. Matching new hires to the demands of a job helps build an injury-free workforce. Healthy workers also help meet your customers' expectations.

Pre-work screening (PWS) and **medical exams** are used for new applicants and employee transfers. PWS tests a job applicant's ability to safely perform a job's physical requirements. It also gives our doctor valuable information to make work clearance decisions.



Saliva testing coming soon

Saliva testing is quickly becoming a popular way to test for drugs of abuse. It compares favorably to urine testing because:

- Captures more recent use of drugs
- Completely observable by clinic staff
- Extremely difficult to cheat
- No shy bladder or diluted specimen issues
